



## Creating Your Biosecurity Map

Please submit a biosecurity map for each site that you are applying for accreditation. This map will help you identify the biosecurity strengths and weaknesses on your property.

### Your map should include the following:

<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Perimeter area</li><li>2. Access point(s) roadways, gates, signage</li><li>3. Line of separation between birdhouses, sheds, barns and grading floors</li><li>4. Designated parking area for visitors &amp; contractors</li><li>5. Movement of eggs (e.g. from farm to grading floor)</li><li>6. Carcass disposal/pickup location, carcass removal pathways</li></ol>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>7. Vehicle movements (animal transport vehicles, deliveries, etc.)</li><li>8. Site entry for barns, sheds, houses and grading floors</li><li>9. Boot wash locations</li><li>10. Bait stations location</li><li>11. Hand wash facilities/locations</li><li>12. Waste disposal areas (litter, compost sites)</li><li>13. Water storage</li><li>14. Dams, stormwater drains, ponds, etc.</li><li>15. Feed silos</li><li>16. Equipment wash troughs</li></ol>

- Use an existing site plan or pest control map & hand draw what's mentioned in the table above
